What is Title I?

- * Title I is the largest federal assistance program for our nation's schools.
- * The goal of Title I is a higher quality of education for every child.
- * The program serves millions of children in elementary and secondary schools each year.

How does Title I Work?

- * The federal government provides funding to states for Title I.
- * The school district identifies eligible schools and allocates Title I funds.

What does it mean to be Title I ?

- * Being Title 1 School means receiving Federal Funding (Title 1 Dollars) to **supplement** the school existing programs. Title 1 Funding is used for:
- * Identifying students experiencing academic difficulties and providing timely assistance to help the students meet the states standards
- * Purchasing supplemental staff /programs / material/ supplies
- * Conducting Parental Involvement meetings / trainings and activities
- * Recruiting Hiring and Retaining Highly Qualified Teachers

What is the 1% set aside and how are parents involved?

- ❖ Any LEA with a Title 1 allocation exceeding 500,000 is required by law to set aside 1% of its Title 1 allocation for parental involvement.
- ❖ Of that 1% , 5 % may be reserved at the LEA for system wide initiatives related to parental involvement. The remaining 95% must be allocated to the Title 1 Schools in the LEA. Therefore each Title 1 School receives its portion of the 95% to implement school level parental involvement
- ❖ You as the Title 1 Parent have the right to be involved in how the money is spent

What is the LEA Title 1 Plan ?

- * The LEA Title 1 Plan address how the LEA will use the Title 1 Funds throughout the school system. Topics Include:
 - Student academic assessments
 - Additional assistance provide to struggling students
 - Coordination and integration of Federal Programs
 - School programs including migrant, pre school, school choice, and supplemental educational services as needed.
 - Parental Involvement strategies including the LEA Parental Involvement Plan

You as the Title 1 Parent have the right to be involved in the development of the LEA Title 1 Plan

What is a C.I.P. ?



The CIP is your schools Campus Improvement Plan and includes:

- Campus Needs Assessment
- Goals and Strategies to address Academic Needs of Students
- Professional Development Needs
- Coordination of Resources and comprehensive budget
- The School parental involvement plan

You as Title 1 Parents have the right to be involved in the development of this plan

What's included in the Parental Involvement Plan?

The Plan address how the school will implement the Parental Involvement Requirements of the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001.

Components Include:

- ❖ How parents can be involved in decision making activities
- ❖ How parental involvement funds are being used
- ❖ How information and training will be provided to parents
- ❖ How the school will build capacity in parents and staff for strong parental involvement

What is the School Parent Compact ? Working Together !



- * The compact is a commitment from the school the parent and the student to share in the responsibility for improved academic achievement
- * You as Title 1 Parents have the right to be involved in the development of the school parent compact
- * School Parent Compact will be distributed

Teacher Qualifications !

- * How do I request qualifications of my child's teacher?
- * You as Title 1 Parents have the right to request the qualifications of your child's teachers
- * How are you notified of this right and the process for making this request?

Parent Notification !

- * WHS Teachers Present Status of Teachers
- * Notification of parents regarding teachers that are not considered to be Highly Qualified
- * How are parents Notified?

Parent's Rights

It is your right to:

- *Be involved and request regular meetings to express your opinions and concerns;
- *Be provided information on your child's level of achievement on state assessments in reading/language arts, writing, mathematics, and science;
- *Request and receive information on the qualifications of your child's teacher; and
- *Be informed if your child is taught by a non-highly qualified teacher for four or more consecutive weeks.

Home-School Compact

- * Lists School Responsibilities
- * Lists Family Responsibilities
- * Lists Student Responsibilities
- * The Home-School Compact is **required** to be discussed during Parent -Teacher Conferences throughout the year.

Support Your Child's Education

- * Share a love of learning:
- * Read to your child
- * Ask your child to read to you
- * Limit TV/screen time
- * Take advantage of the public library and the school media center

- * Show interest in your child's school day:
- * Ask questions
- * Ask to see homework
- * Praise their efforts
- * Encourage good study habits

How parents can help their child.

- * Keep teachers informed
- * Attend school events
- * Volunteer at the school
- * Join parent committees
- * Attend parent involvement activities

- * Attend parent-teacher conferences
 - Be prepared for the meetings
 - List your questions before the meeting
- * Consider whether you have met your responsibilities as stated in the home-school compact
